In 2016, she was honoured with the Ewart-Daveluy Award and, in 2021, shortlisted for the Tom Fairley Award for Editorial Excellence.

**Alexandra Peace** edits, proofreads, and indexes in rural Nova Scotia within a strong national and international network of colleagues. Alexandra indexes scholarly and trade books, edits trade books, and teaches indexing at the Chang School, Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly known as Ryerson). She has a science degree from McMaster University from a long time ago. Alexandra has won volunteer awards from both Editors Canada and ISC/SCI.

#### **Session 1: Keynote Speaker, Dennis Duncan (80 minutes)**

We are pleased and excited to have Dennis as our keynote speaker this year. You will have heard by now about his much-lauded new book *Index, A History of the*. You won't want to miss him talking about it.



Dennis Duncan is a writer, translator, lecturer in English at University College London, and a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society. He has published numerous academic books, including Book Parts and The Oulipo and Modern Thought, as well as translations of Michel Foucault, Boris Vian, and Alfred Jarry. His writing has appeared in the Guardian, the Times Literary Supplement, and the London Review of Books, and recent articles have considered Mallarmé and jugs, James Joyce and pornography, and the history of Times New Roman.

#### Session 2: Parliamentary Indexing, Alexandre Grandmaître (50 minutes)

Parliament is steeped in tradition, and so is the publishing and indexing of the *Debates of the House of Commons (Hansard)*, the official transcript of the proceedings. This serial publication serves as a great example for a case study to explore this year's conference theme.

Alexandre will explore some of the history of indexing the Debates and of the indexing profession at the House of Commons, discuss key elements of the current information environment with an emphasis on the evolution of the controlled vocabulary, and provide his insights into what may come next.

**Alexandre Grandmaître** is the Authority List Specialist in the Information Management Unit of the Parliamentary Information and Publications Directorate of the House of Commons. He has been responsible for the controlled vocabulary since 2018. He has also served as subject matter expert on website redesign projects and information management solutions.

**Stephen Ullstrom** is an indexer and writer living in Edmonton, Alberta. He wrote his first index in 2011, started freelancing in 2012, and last year won the 2021 Ewart-Daveluy Indexing Award. He is also writing a practical introduction to indexing, which he hopes to self-publish this year.

**Judy Dunlop** has been a freelance indexer for more than twenty years. She specializes in scholarly indexes for humanities and social sciences books, with a special interest in Indigenous peoples, law and legal studies, and education.





**Gillian Watts** has been a freelance editor since 1998, specializing in copy and stylistic editing, proofreading, and back-of-the-book indexing. She's known for meticulous attention to detail, an (almost) photographic memory, and a wide range of knowledge and interests. Clients range from trade, academic, and educational publishers to first-time authors.

# Session 5: Hacking Yourself: Think Like a Hacker to Prevent Cyber Attacks, Bryson Payne (50 minutes)

Dr. Bryson Payne, author of  $Go\ H^*ck\ Yourself$ , will share ten things you can do right now to protect yourself from cyber criminals. No one is completely safe from online threats, but by taking a few smart precautions, you can avoid being an easy target for attackers. From social engineering to physical security, after this session you'll be better prepared to defend yourself and the people you care about from online attacks.

**Dr. Bryson Payne** is an award-winning cyber coach, author, TEDx speaker, and the founding Director of the Institute for Cyber Operations at the University of North Georgia, an NSA-DHS Center for Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense. He holds a Ph.D. in computer science from Georgia State University.



# Session 6: Teaching Indexing Concepts in the Twenty-First Century, Valerie Nesset (50 minutes)

Library and information science students need to have a strong understanding of fundamental LIS concepts, especially in the organization of information. Yet, as the field expands beyond libraries to embrace many new and different information environments, information professionals need to broaden their outlook so that these foundational concepts can be defined and understood in different and more inclusive ways, based on user needs. This talk will present strategies on how to redefine foundational concepts such as indexing to better address user needs through the conceptualization and representation of information.



**Dr. Valerie (Val) Nesset** is an Associate Professor at the University at Buffalo, in Buffalo, New York, where she teaches the course "Conceptualizing and Representing Information." Val's recent research areas include user experience (UX) and participatory design, and the intersection of information literacy instruction and information behavior as it relates to young elementary students.

#### Session 7: In Defense of Marking-Up, Devon Thomas (50 minutes)

This session looks at one indexer's approach to marking up. It includes discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of marking up, from facilitating analysis to finding ancillary themes and topics and easing eye strain. We will discuss techniques for marking up, such as highlighting, use of shortcuts and codes, and adjusting techniques per project, as well as identifying situations when marking up does not make sense.

**Devon Thomas**, M.I.L.S., has been a freelance indexer since 2006. Before that, she was a business and public librarian. She is a Past-President of the American Society for Indexing (ASI). Devon indexes in a wide range of topics, with an emphasis on the humanities, but enjoys books from many subject areas. Her work includes traditional back-of-the-book indexing and embedded indexing in InDesign, XML, and Microsoft Word.
